

Please register as soon as possible. Membership is a condition of the Sacraments of Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Eucharist, Confirmation and Marriage. Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be sacramental sponsors. You must be registered for at least three months before a certificate will be given. Registration forms are available in the commons of the church.

The Parish Council is a consultative body whose policies and decisions require the authority of the pastor to become effective. Its function is established under the guidelines of the Diocese of Raleigh. The Council works with the pastor to develop parish priorities and directions. COMMUNICATIONS

STAYING INFORMED

BULLETINS - our weekly bulletin is circulated every weekend at Mass and is also available through our church website and our MyParish app. The bulletin is full of information pertinent to our church. Requests to post articles should be sent to shcbulletin@earthlink.net - please see bulletin for deadlines, etc.

We encourage our parishioners to check the goods and services offered on the back of their bulletins - these ads defray printing costs.

MYPARISH APP - an electronic system for smart phones that connects parish members. It will keep you updated on events, schedule changes, etc. You will have prayers, readings, etc. in your pocket.

WEBSITE - the hub of any and all information about our church. Parishioners and guests can look here for just about anything they need - from our location and phone number to our daily and weekend Mass times. The website also has links to the 8:30 a.m. Sunday Mass live-stream, and to our bulletins.

LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

ADORATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

is held in the chapel each Wednesday from 9:30 am to 2:00 pm. You are asked to commit for an hour (sign up forms are available in the chapel foyer.) Please be sure to sign in and out. Or drop by for a visit whenever time allows during regular church hours.

ALTAR SERVERS - cross bearer, candle bearers and assistants - responsible for service to the celebrant. This ministry is open to children who have made their First Communion and adults of all ages. Training is provided.

EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS - assist in the distribution of the Holy Eucharist at Mass. Must check in with the Mass Coordinator at least 15 minutes prior to Mass. Training is provided.

EUCHARIST FOR THE SICK - bring Holy Communion to the sick and shut-ins of the parish. Communion may be requested by calling the church office.

LECTORS - the function of this ministry is to make announcements and assist with the readings during liturgies. This demands audible, clear, thoughtful delivery of the assigned readings. Training is provided and practice is essential.

MASS COORDINATORS - check that the Tabernacle is unlocked, the celebrant's host is at the altar, and all scheduled ministers are present (appoint substitutes if necessary.) Also select gift bearers. Should arrive at least 30 minutes early to take care of responsibilities. Training is provided.

MASS PREP ASSISTANTS - help the sacristan prepare and maintain the worship environment by cleaning altar linens, vestments, ceremonial vessels, and the sacristy. Also help with decorating for ordinary time and special occasions. Training is provided.

MUSIC/CHOIR - everyone is welcome to inquire about participating. We have music at all weekend and Holy Day Masses. The Choir alternates between masses and members rehearse weekly. Music is also provided for special services.

USHERS - warmly welcome all who join us, offer aid to any who need assistance, coordinate the offertory and communion, and lead one of the Eucharistic Ministers to any individuals who need to receive at her/his seat. Training is provided.

FUNERALS

Please contact the church office to make arrangements after the loss of a loved one.

BEREAVEMENT

This ministry provides support to the bereaved of our parish. Members will plan and host receptions for the bereaved family and friends following Funeral Masses. The heart of our ministry consists of one-on-one visits with a trained minister to support our bereaved after a loss. In addition we also offer weekly grief support group meetings for our bereaved.

COLUMBARIUM

HISTORY - 'Columbarium' is derived from the Latin word 'Columba' (dove), the symbol of the Holy Spirit and the Christian symbol of peace. Since 1963, Catholics have been allowed to choose cremation over burial as a means of laying a loved one to rest. Under Church guidelines, when someone has been cremated, their ashes must be kept intact, the same as one would treat a body. They should remain in a proper vessel that is interred in a proper place, such as a cemetery or church.

ELIGIBILITY - the Sacred Heart Catholic Church Columbarium and Garden are primarily for the deceased members of Sacred Heart Parish and their immediate family.

SERVICES - arrangements for the interment of cremated remains must be made through the pastor. The rites of interment will be in keeping with the Roman Catholic Forms of Worship. The Columbarium and Garden is a place of prayer and meditation.

PURPOSE - The Sacred Heart Columbarium and Memorial Garden is designed to provide a place on the church property for the permanent preservation of the cremated remains of church members and their immediate family. It provides a focal point to help fill our desire to be remembered and to remember our deceased loved ones. This is a place for those who love Sacred Heart Catholic Church and have a sense of closeness to it, which they would like to preserve even after death. It is hallowed ground, sacred to the memory of those who have departed from our midst.

MANAGEMENT - a Columbarium Committee will manage the Columbarium and Garden. This committee, with the approval of the pastor, shall be responsible for all areas of the Columbarium administration and perpetual care.

FAITH DEVELOPMENT

Baptism - Jesus was baptized and taught his Apostles to do likewise. Through Baptism we become members of the Body of Christ as we are incorporated into the Church. Please contact the church office for preparation.

Bible Study - God speaks to us through the Bible. The Bible Study group utilizes Catholic Church approved materials in order to deepen our understanding of God and enhance our own spirituality.

Divine Mercy Devotions - all are welcome to join the Divine Mercy devotions after the noon Mass on First Fridays at 8:30 a.m. and First Saturdays at 9:00 a.m. A special devotion is also held at 3:00 p.m. on Divine Mercy Sunday.

Faith Sharing for Men - this group is open to discuss all things Catholic. Members share the experience of being Catholic and their views on the issues facing the church. This group also presents a Lenten program and participates in the Stations of the Cross.

Faith Study Group - members work together to achieve a deeper understanding of our Catholic faith, thus establishing a closer relationship to Our Lord by studying his holy word and teachings using Father Mike Schmidt's Catechism in a Year.

Legion of Mary - a world-wide organization of the lay apostolate, in which Catholic men and women sanctify themselves through prayer and spiritual work in union with Mary, the Mother of God. Call the church office for contact information.

OCIA Faith Formation - Order of Christian Initiation of Adults - for those wishing to learn more about the Catholic faith or about becoming Catholic.

OCIC Faith Formation - Order of Christian Initiation of Children. The Sacred Heart "Youth Crusade" is based on relational ministry. Programs include:

"Good Shepherd" - Pre-K through first
"Blessed" by Dynamic Catholic - second
"Better Bible Teachers" - 3rd through 5th
"The Edge" - middle school and
"Life Teen" - high school.

The Sacred Heart Youth Crusade also offers sacramental preparation for first reconciliation, first communion and confirmation. Our yearly vacation bible school is a catholic program called "CatChat."

Teams of Our Lady - offers couples a unique way to grow in love and intimacy through this worldwide Catholic lay movement founded in 1937 by Father Henri Caffarel in France. Couples meet once a month in one another's homes with a spiritual moderator, sharing a light meal and a chapter in a book they have chosen to discuss. Date varies to correspond with the couples' schedules.

PARISH COMMUNITY

AGAPE MEAL MINISTRY - members offer meals to parish families in times of hardship due to illness, injury, surgery or any situation where they might find themselves in need of help. We focus on healing and recovery.

ANCIENT ORDER OF HIBERNIANS - an organization of active Catholics of Irish descent. Membership symbolizes a commitment to friendship, unity and Christian charity.

CANCER SUPPORT - Faith-based group for those with cancer and their caregivers. The hope is to be able to openly discuss daily mental, emotional, and physical challenges.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS - a fraternal organization of practicing Catholic men 18 years or older. Members are committed to our faith, country, and serving our community.

LADIES GUILD - open to all registered women in the parish. They participate in social, ecumenical, and occasional fund-raising activities to support our parish community. See the Ladies Guild page for details.

PARKINSON'S SUPPORT - for those with Parkinson's and their caregiver. We hope to share our journeys while learning from each other and outside resources.

POINSETTIAS - help distribute holiday poinsettias to parishioners who are homebound or in nursing facilities, and to members to commemorate the loss of a spouse or child during the year.

PRAYER REQUESTS - we are all called to offer prayers for the sick and those in need. The prayer list is published in the weekly church bulletin.

Knights of Columbus

Sacred Heart Council No. 12537 Father Robert T. Lawson Assembly



Founded in 1882, the Knights of Columbus is a fraternal Catholic men's organization open to all practicing Catholic men over the age eighteen. The Knights are based on the principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity and Patriotism and are in solidarity with the Catholic Church, the Holy Father, the bishops, priests and religious.

In August 1999, our Sacred Heart Knights of Columbus Council No. 12537 was established with 63 charter members. As of March 2025, membership has grown to 252 Catholic men committed to our Church, Community, Families, our Youth and service to our fellow man.

Within our parish, Knights serve as ushers, lectors, altar servers and Eucharistic Ministers. We also serve in many other ministries; Finance Committee, Parish Council and other faith-based ministries within the Parish. Knights started weekly Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, the "Keep Christ in Christmas" program, the Men's Lenten Retreat, and the Right to Life Rosary. In addition to assisting the pastor, the good works performed by Council members include helping with church activities, such as decorating the church for Holiday celebration and maintenance as well as offering support to parishioners in need. A parish of this size has many opportunities to help.

The Knights volunteer countless hours to raise funds for Brunswick County charities. Projects include the Annual Charity Golf Tournament, Family Dinners and Operation LAMB (Least Amongst My Brothers), aka the "tootsie roll" drive. Organizations supported include; Special Olympics, Seminarians, Exceptional Children, Interfaith Food Pantry, Matthews Ministry, Providence Home, New Hope Clinic, Hope Harbor Home, Habitat for Humanity, Computers for Kids, Samara's Village, Communities In Schools, Waves4Kids, and Brunswick Christian Recovery Center. They also provide scholarships for graduating South Brunswick High School seniors and offer assistance to residents of Coastal Villas.

The Fourth Degree Knights have established the Father Robert T. Lawson Assembly dedicated to the principle of Patriotism. They bring steak-cookouts to the Wounded Warrior Barracks at Fort Bragg (Army) and Camp Lejeune (Marines) and to our local Coast Guard detachment on Oak Island. They visit the NC Veterans Nursing Home providing food, entertainment and fellowship for these forgotten vets. The Assembly also provides a color guard at the Southport 4th of July Celebration, the Oak Island Christmas Parade and at church services as requested.

Our Council offers many social and family activities such as our quarterly Italian Dinners, St. Patrick's Day Dinner and Oktoberfest Dinner, Wives' Night Out, children's Christmas Party and our annual Knight's Christmas Dinner Dance.

As part of the largest organization of Catholic men in the world, we play a leading role in service to our Pope, our priests, our parish family and our community. We are always looking for new Catholic Gentlemen to join our ranks, bringing new ideas and enthusiasm to our mission. Our work ahead is great and the more hands we have the more we can do to advance our Catholic beliefs.

A Guide to the Church's History and Statues & Stained Glass

A Brief History of Sacred Heart Catholic Church

The first Sacred Heart Church was built in 1941 on Caswell Avenue in Southport with extra funding from the Diocese of Cleveland under the direction of pastor Frank Howard. There were less than ten families and very few visitors. By 1985, there were over 200 families and up to 600 weekly visitors during the summer. The need for a larger facility was evident and the new Sacred Heart Church on Dosher Cut-Off Road was dedicated in March 1991 with 300 families in the parish.

Unexpected growth prompted pastor Father Douglas Lawson to expand. A beautiful new sanctuary was built, designed by The East Group, with Bradley-Barnes as the General Contractor. The existing sanctuary became a much needed social hall and office space was also added, along with a Columbarium and Memorial Garden. The Church is 15,250 square feet with a total capacity of 1,000. It was dedicated by Bishop F. Joseph Grossman in November 2003.

The parish has grown to over 1,500 families under the guidance of pastors, Fr. Trent Watts. Fr. Vic Gournas and Fr. Thanh Nguyen.

Statues in the Sanctuary

(Hand-carved in Italy from lindenwood)

Front left - Mary, the Virgin Mother of Jesus

Front right - **St. Joseph**, the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus. He was a carpenter who,

despite his humble means, was a descendant of David, the greatest king of Israel.

Left side front - **St. Isaac Jogues**, one of the heroic Jesuit missionaries canonized as the Martyrs of North America in 1930. From 1636 he worked successfully with the Hurons in Quebec. In 1642 he was imprisoned and tortured for a year by the Iroquois, then captured by the Mo-

hawks & beheaded in 1646. (Source: The Wisdom of the Saints—Biographical Notes)

Left side back - **St. Kateri Tekakwitha** was born in 1656 of an Algonquin mother and a Mohawk chief in

the Mohawk village of Canaouaga (now Auriesville) in upstate New York. At age 19, she converted to Catholicism, taking a vow of chastity and pledging to marry only Jesus Christ. Her decision was very unpopular and some of her neighbors started rumors of sorcery. To avoid persecution, she traveled to the Mission of St. Francis Xavier, a settlement of Christian Indians in Canada. While there, Kateri taught prayers to children and worked with the elderly and sick. She was known for her great devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and to the Cross of Christ. She died of smallpox on April 17, 1680, at age 24. She became the first Native American Saint in the United Stated on October 21, 2012.

Right side front - St. Francis of Assisi, the most universally known and beloved of all saints, Francis was

born to a wealthy silk merchant. He spent his youth in pursuit of pleasure and glory in war and had an idealized, chivalric image. He was captured in battle, imprisoned and suffered a serious illness which changed his temperament. He had compelling visions of Christ and began to devote his life to serving the sick and poor. After a break from his father, Francis turned to a life of absolute poverty and simplicity, wandering through the world calling all to the practice of charity and penance. In 1224 he received the stig-

mata, the five wounds of the crucified Christ.

Statues in the Day Chapel

(From the original Church located in downtown Southport.)

The Blessed Mother

The Sacred Heart of Jesus

The Stations of the Cross

Altar, Baptism Fountain and Holy Water Font

(Made of empress green marble quarried in Italy.)

Stained Glass in the Sanctuary

(Designed by Father Methodius Telnack, O.C.S.O)

Over the Altar

The rose window is Jesus, the Divine Mercy, from Sister Faustina's vision.

The three right windows represent the seed, which becomes the wheat, which becomes the bread, which is the Body of Christ.

The three left windows represent the water, which becomes the grape, which produces the wine, which is the Blood of Christ.

In the Clerestory

(Windows in the upper portion of the walls to supply natural light.)

The front four windows on either side of the clerestory are based the hymn "Mary the Dawn" written by Paul Cross in 1949.
